
My Journey Through Words: Why I Am Writing Again

She completed her first PhD at Western Sydney University, concentrating on folk Islam and Muslim women's gender perceptions in urban Bangladesh. After a five-year career break to raise her young children, Dr. Mahbuba returned to academia and is currently pursuing a second PhD at Australian Catholic University, focusing on the intersectionality of religion and migration in spousal financial abuse among Bangladeshi migrant Muslim women in Australia. She has worked as a sessional teacher at Western Sydney University, Macquarie University, and Australian Catholic University. Born and raised in the Global South and now living in the Global North, Dr. Mahbuba is a passionate advocate for social justice. She is involved with several non-profit organizations dedicated to supporting women and migrants.
